# Report on Wells Twinning Association by Cllr Deborah Orrett, Wells City Council representative on the WTA committee.

Wells Twinning Association was established in 1988 and is currently chaired by Dawn Payne with meetings held every 6 weeks. It has always had close links with WCC and I have full voting rights as a member of the committee.

Twinning in Wells was first established in 1979 with our French counterpart Paray-le Monial in order that the two places "will enjoy strong links of friendship and gain in culture, commerce, trade, entertainment, sport and pastimes and for there to be greater understanding between the respective nations"

In 1983 a charter was signed with Bad Durkheim in Germany (which was already twinned with Paray-le Monial).

"Friendship agreements" have also been signed with Bad Berka, a small town in Germany and with Kluczbork in Poland (in 2010)

In 2012 a twinning charter was signed with Commune di Fontanellato near Parma in Italy

WTA has around 140 members who pay a small annual subscription. They also fundraise to be able to subsidise some trips to our twinned towns. They receive no outside funding although WCC has generously paid for accommodation for visiting Mayors on numerous occasions and will host drinks in the Mayor's parlour during a visit. It is felt that WCC can only contribute to expenses of formally twinned towns and not the friendship "arrangements".

WTA is keen to "open up" interest in twinning with young people getting involved to expand the interest from its traditional image of exchange amongst the retired.

They have established a 3 year plan so they know what visits will occur. Often a visit will coincide with the Wells carnival in November (although Kluczbork is no longer able to come over this autumn)

Stewart Cursley was due to visit Bad Durkheim last month but had to withdraw due to the death of the Queen. He had paid near to £1000 for his flight and other expenses himself.

10 members are travelling to Bad Durkheim in October. They may be accommodated in people's homes or will otherwise pay hotels costs themselves.

Mayors in our twin towns tend to hold the position for more than one year. Stewart has written a letter of introduction to all the Mayors.

WTA are currently rebuilding their website and are keen this should be accessed via the Wells City Council website to maintain close links.

I shall continue to be involved with this enthusiastic group of people and these beautiful places to maintain healthy relationships post Brexit.

#### **AGENDA ITEM 15**

Motion calling on Wells City Council to declare a Climate Emergency:

#### Full Council notes:

- human activity has already caused irreversible climate change, the impact of which is felt around the world. Global temperatures have increased by over 1 degree Celsius from pre-industrial levels. Atmospheric CO2 levels are over 406 parts per million (ppm), far exceeding the 350 ppm deemed a 'safe' level for humanity<sup>6</sup>. The world is on track to overshoot the Paris Agreement's 1.5°C limit before 2030;<sup>2,3</sup>
- the IPCC's Special Report on Global Warming of 1.5°C published in November 2018
  describes the harm that a 2°C rise is likely to cause, and tells us that limiting Global
  Warming to 1.5°C may still be possible with ambitious action from national and regional
  authorities, civil society, the private sector, indigenous peoples and local communities<sup>3</sup>;
- in order to reduce the chance of runaway Global Warming and limit the effects of Climate Breakdown, it is imperative that each of us reduces our CO2 eq (carbon equivalent) emissions from their current 6.5 tonnes per person per year to less than 2 tonnes without delay;¹
- 4. individuals can accept responsibility for living in a more sustainable way but cannot be expected to make all changes without support. Carbon emissions result from both production and consumption, so Governments - national, regional and local - must change legislation, standards and their approach to meet the need to reduce our CO2 eq emissions and make low carbon living easier to achieve and the new 'norm';
- Local Authorities and Councils across the world are responding by declaring a 'Climate Emergency' and committing to address this emergency. In the South West, many Councils have already taken this step.<sup>4</sup>
- 6. the Covenant of Mayors, a free network of towns and cities around the globe who have committed to reducing carbon emissions by 2030. The network enables members to share best practice, ideas and funding, and works to create a Sustainable Energy and Climate Action Plan (SECAP) every two years which enables towns and cities to track progress towards meeting their zero carbon targets.

#### Full Council believes that:

- All governments have a duty to limit the negative impacts of Climate Breakdown, and local government recognises it cannot and should not wait for national government to act.
- It is important for the residents of the City of Wells that its Council commits to reducing CO2 eq emissions and works towards carbon neutrality as quickly as possible;

Bold climate action can deliver economic benefits by way of new jobs, economic savings, market opportunities and improved well-being.

#### Full Council moves to:

- Declare a 'Climate Emergency';
- Pledge to make the City of Wells carbon neutral by 2030, working proactively with others where opportunities arise, taking into account both production and consumption emissions (scope 1, 2 and 3)<sup>5</sup>;
- Become a signatory to the Covenant of Mayors;
- Work with residents, organisations and community action groups across the City to deliver this new goal through all relevant plans and actions;
- Assist the City of Wells' residents to become more resilient to the impacts of global warming;
- Report to Full Council before the end of 2019 with the actions the Council has, and will take, to address this emergency.
- Report to the City of Wells' residents on an annual basis to demonstrate progress in making the City of Wells carbon neutral by 2030.

Background

On 1st April 2023 a new unitary Somerset Council will replace Somerset County Council and the four district councils (Mendip, Sedgemoor, Somerset West and Taunton, and South Somerset).

Somerset Council will cover a large geographical area. Council Leaders are mindful that we need a model for communities where local voices are heard, partners are brought together, and decisions are taken with the benefit of local knowledge and experience. That's why all the Somerset councils support the development of Local Community Networks (LCNs).

- ✓ LCNs will be established in every part of Somerset.
- They will be Committees of the unitary Council, supported by dedicated officers and managers.
- They will have formal decision-making powers and influence.
- They will enable the Council, partners and communities to work together to address local issues and priorities, support health and wellbeing activities, and improve outcomes for residents.
- LCNs must be affordable and have the potential to develop their role alongside the new Somerset Council in the years to come.











Throughout the summer we have been working on developing the LCN model. This consultation asks for your involvement in guiding the decisions on the following key aspects:

- Function what roles and responsibilities the LCNs can have in the first and subsequent years of Somerset Council.
- Form development of options for the LCN boundaries, using existing democratic boundaries, Local Plans and community infrastructure
- Name whether 'Local Community Network' is the right name.

# What happens next?

#### **Timeline**

The LCN consultation will begin on 5th September and close on 17th October 2022. Following the consultation, a formal decision paper, including a resourcing plan, will be submitted to Somerset County Council's Executive, scheduled for 16th November 2022.

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# LCN Boundaries Proposals

In developing LCNs, we want to reflect the way in which our communities work and therefore we are keen communities and partners are involved in how they develop.

To help assess the proposals, we looked at a range of factors, to enable comparisons to be drawn. We tried to think about where people live, work, go to school and access services, including health. In all cases we kept to parish outlines as closely as possible.

The things we considered:


- Population we looked at how balanced the population numbers were in each LCN, how important or not is it that they have similar numbers of residents in each area
- Geographies how similar in size of area they were, and their distribution/spread across Somerset
- Electoral Divisions the number of Unitary Electoral divisions, and how they split within, and across, LCN boundaries
- Deprivation using indices of multiple deprivation, we looked at how the most and least deprived areas were distributed
- . Community Facilities, eg. Libraries we looked at where these were situated
- Health we compared the 'fit' of Primary Care Network (PCN) boundaries to LCN boundaries
- Secondary School Catchment Areas we checked how these were split in relation to LCNs, recognising schools are often at the heart of communities
- Travel to Work Area we looked at their alignment to LCN areas
- . Current Local Plan Geographies we looked at their alignment to LCN areas

Based on analysis of this range of data and intelligence, **THREE** potential boundary proposals were identified – and we would welcome your comments on each of them.

- 1. Proposal A would have 18 LCNs
- Proposal B would have 17 LCNs
- 3. Proposal C would have 10 LCNs

- In this proposal, there would be 18 LCNs all a similar size in terms of area giving an even coverage across the county
- The population is not spread evenly across the county, and this results in a wide population size spread across the LCNs
- Many electoral divisions sit within one LCN with 15 sitting across 2 LCNs, 6 across 3, and 2 across 4 LCNs
- Most deprived areas sit within major population centres, and these remain similar across all proposals
- · All LCNs contain at least one library with several containing 2 or more
- The majority of LCNs overlap between 2 and 4 PCNs
- The majority of LCNs overlap between 3 -5 secondary school catchment areas. 4 LCNs overlap 7 or 8 catchments areas





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- · In this proposal, there would be 10 LCNs
- · Generally, a good fit maintained with parish boundaries
- Population is well balanced across 9 of the 10 LCNs, where population ranges from 50,000 to 65,000. However, area to the west of Somerset is significantly lower at 35,005
- The LCN around the largest towns of Yeovil and Taunton is smaller in terms of area
- Large single area to the west of Somerset
- · Note 'horseshoe' area wrapping the south of Taunton
- · Strong fit with electoral divisions
- Most deprived areas sit within major population centres, and these remain similar across all proposals
- All LCNs contain at least one library with several containing 2 or more, due to the larger geographical size in this proposal, 4 LCNs contain 4+ libraries each
- · Many of the LCNs overlap between 2 and 4 PCNs

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- Many LCNs overlap between 3-6 secondary school catchment areas, no LCNs in this proposal match a single catchment area
- A close match with existing Local Plan Geographies, meaning that in the short to medium term LCNs would each work only with one Local Plan
